City of Whitewright Council Meeting January 3, 2023

The first meeting of the new year was held at 6:30 pm. The meeting was led by Mayor Pro Tem Traci Barr. Council members Barry Wheeler, John Simon, Diana Scott, and Shirley Ballard were present. Shirley Ballard led the invocation and pledge.

There were no citizens comments for the council to hear, and they moved on to review the list of upcoming events.

The council then reviewed, no questions were asked, and voted 5-0 to approved the consent agenda.

The council then considered a contract extension for Underwood Construction until February 15, 2023. The public works director explained that due to several bad weather days the work was not complete, and the company felt certain they could meet the new deadline. Latimer explained the city would still retain the right to charge a penalty if the new deadline was not met. However, any revenue or refund from the penalty would go to GTUA and not the city. The council voted 5-0 to approve the extension.

The council then discussed terminating the recycling dumpster service. Latimer explained that less than 10 residents were utilizing the service. City Secretary Nancy Reynolds provided the council with a review of the cost for the recycling dumpster and the dumping of its contents for the last year. After a brief discussion, the council voted 5-0 to terminate the service and save the taxpayers fund for another use.

With no council concerns to be addressed the meeting was adjourned.

Whitewright ISD Board of Trustees Meeting December 12, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. Board members present were Linda Jester, Kelly Selman, Danielle Kennemur, June Purdom, Tammy Francis and Marvin Arterberry. Administrators present were Brian Garner, Bobby Worthy, Crystal Trotter, Dustin Pittman, Charles Nash, Ashley Helms, and Chad Long.

The cross country coach recognized senior girls Danielle Slack and Mia Card, juniors Rosio Ordenz and Erin Ulmer, and freshman Cassidy Shea along with with the boys junior Zac Mortensen and freshman Dallen Mortensen for their outstanding work this season. Coach Marsh was also there to recognize her Lady Tiger Volleyball team. With 7 seniors, 1 Junior and 5 freshman, the Lady Tigers had a 30-12 season, and Coach Marsh was named District Coach of the Year.

Mrs. Womble then presented the board with some information regarding the CREST Counseling Award she had worked hard to earn. Mrs. Womble and the Elementary will be honored at the TSCA conference in February.

The board then adjourned into a closed session. Upon return, Chad Long was awarded a 2 year contract beginning July 2023. Mr. Long will be taking over as Assistant Superintendant for Bobby Worthy who is retiring this year. The motion was passed 6-0.

Superintendant Garner presented the board with the recalculation of the Financial Integrity Rating for the district. The new rating of A was awarded after corrections were made bringing the score from 88 to 98. He also presented the findings from the financial audit to the board. The board approved the audit 6-0.

The board unanimously approved the consent agenda and moved on to other business of the meeting. Construction of dressing rooms at the baseball field for \$59,275 was unanimously approved. The purchase of a new microphone and speaker system for the high school gym was unanimously approved at the cost of \$36,926.

Armko Industries, a roofing consulting company, gave a presentation to the board regarding the condition of the high school’s roof. The school was built in 1998, and the addition was completed in 2004. After a brief discussion following the presentation, the board voted 6-0 for Armko Industries to oversee the high school roofing renovations project.

The campus administrators gave their enrollment and campus activities reports along with the report from Coach Wiggins, the Athletic Director, on the current standing for teams and seasons about to begin. The current enrollment for WISD is 790 including 390 at WES, 181 at WMS, and 219 at WHS. Garner then gave an update on the construction of the CTE center. The company has suffered some setback with the weather and has three more pours to complete. Board member Kelly Selman inquired about the plans for hiring additional teachers for the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th grade. Garner said those positions were being planned and budgeted for next year.

The Whitewright Sun experienced a camera failure shortly after this meeting, and all photos taken were lost. The Sun’s publisher would like to apologize for the equipment failure and lack of photos.

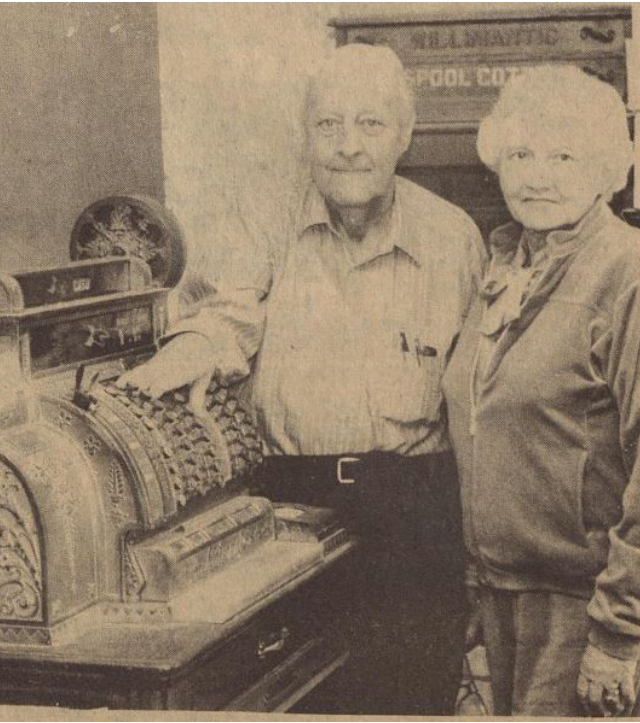

Down Memory Lane

100 Years Ago
January 25, 1923

The Internal Revenue Bureau will order the liberalization of existing regulations limiting the number of liquor prescriptions which physicians may issue if the present widespread influenza epidemic assumes dangerous proportion it was declared at the Treasury Department Saturday night.

Although whisky and other spirits are recognized as valuable medicine in the treatment of influenza and related ailments, under present regulation physicians are not permitted to issue more than 100 liquor prescriptions in three months.

A serious wave of gripe appears to be hovering over the entire county the United States public health service announced.

From all sections came reports of the disease described by Surgeon General Cumming as too severe for ordinary gripe and coming more properly under the category of influenza in a mild form.

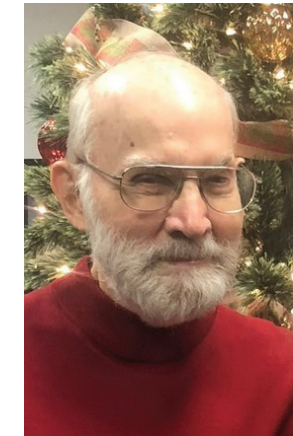
The south has been hardest hit by the sickness thus far, the reports show, but it has made itself felt in more or less severe form in every part of the country.





The Family Budget


