WISD School Canceled on February 1st Less Than Two Weeks Notice Given to Parents Superintendent Contract Extended Again

The Whitewright ISD Board of Trustees held their regular meeting on Thursday, January 19, 2023. All members of the board were present along with the district's administrators. The board president did not conduct the pledge, have an invocation, permit public comments, or hold a public hearing for the TARP report, in which published notice was given a hearing was to be held at 6:00 pm.

Board President Linda Jester called the meeting to order at 5:33 pm and immediately announced the board would adjourn into executive session. The board of trustees returned from executive session 2 hours and 15 minutes later. Board member Tammy Francis made a motion to extend the contract for Superintendent Brian Garner for an additional year through June 30, 2026. The motion was seconded by Kelly Selman and was approved 6-1 with trustee Marven Arterbery voting against the extension. A second motion was made by Selman and seconded by Francis to approve a probationary contract for Elizabeth Isham, the new Elementary Intervention Teacher, through the end of the 2022-2023 school year. It passed with a 7-0 vote.

Assistant Superintendent Bobby Worthy along with the campus administrators presented a power point to the board of trustees summarizing the Texas Academic Progress Report (TARP). No action was taken.

The board then unanimously approved the consent agenda which included: previous meeting minutes, financial reports, approval of a joint election with the City of Whitewright, a purchasing agreement with Region 10, and the acceptance of gift from The Whitewright Athletic Booster Club for soft-ball screens.

The board unanimously approved an order calling for a May 6, 2023 election. The board also unanimously approved giving the superintendent hiring authority through March 17, 2023. A brief discussion was held regarding the search for a middle school band director, and Garner agreed if it was close to a meeting he would still bring the hiring decision before the board.

Garner then gave his administrative report including a statement regarding 4-day school weeks, a current trend in the state. He stated he had recently attended a meeting with other superintendents in Grayson County, and at this time none of the districts in the county were considering a 4-day week. He informed the board he would not be in favor of recommending the 4-day schedule until someone had proof it improved test scores. Garner also made an announcement that the district would be closing on February 1st to allow staff who administer the STARR test to attend an additional training opportunity. The Texas STAAR redesign was implemented by HB 3906 in 2019, and affect the 2022-2023 school year.

The principals presented the board with their current enrollment and their campus activities along with the athletic director recapping the basketball season progress and a power lifting update.

The meeting adjourned at 8:35 pm. The next meeting of the board of trustees will be on February 27, 2023.

'Niners End Cowboys Playoff Run 19-12

The San Francisco 49ers beat the Dallas Cowboys 19-12 at Levi Stadium in Santa Clara, CA on Sunday night. The win eliminated the Cowboys from the second round of the playoffs while the Niners advanced to the NFC Championship game against the Philadelphia Eagles. .

San Francisco converted two first half interceptions by Dallas quarterback Dak Prescott into two field goals to take a 9-6 lead at halftime. Prescott threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to tight end Dalton Schultz in the second quarter to give the Cowboys a 6-3 lead. Samson Ebukam blocked the ensuing extra point attempt.

The Cowboys struggled to run the ball against the Niners defense. Ezekiel Elliott was held to 26 yards on 10 carries. Tony Pollard started the game but was injured in the third quarter after rushing for 22 yards on six carries.

Ceedee Lamb paced the Cowboys receivers with 117 yards on 10 receptions. Schultz caught five passes for 27 yards and a touchdown.

A touchdown drive that began at the end of the third quarter created the separation the Niners needed. Tight end George Kittle hauled in a 46-yard reception with an outstretched hand that saw the ball bounce off his helmet before he intimately corralled it. That catch was the big play in the drive that saw the Niners take a 16-9 lead.

The Cowboys and Niners traded field goals in the fourth quarter to make it 19-12. The Cowboys got the ball back with 51 seconds in the game but were unable to generate a scoring drive.

Prescott completed 23 of 37 pass attempts for 206 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions. San Francisco's rookie quarterback Brock Purdy completed 19 of 29 attempts for 214 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions.

The Niners had the best defense in the NFL in 2022. The Cowboys simply made too many mistakes to win a defensive battle with them.

PROPERTY TAX CUTS HEADLINE SENATE BUDGET PROPOSAL

The amount that homeowners can write off of the taxable value of their home before assessment would nearly double under the budget proposed by the Senate on Wednesday. SB 1, filed by Senate Finance Committee Chair Senator Joan Huffman of Houston, would increase the homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$70,000 at a cost of \$1.8 billion for the state. Another \$12 billion has been earmarked for further property tax cuts to be proposed in separate legislation. This makes good on a promise made just one day earlier by Lt. Governor Dan Patrick as he was sworn into his third term in office. “The Governor and the Speaker and the Members, we’re going to find a way for long term property tax relief with the billions of dollars from this surplus, because you come first - it’s your money,” he said in his inaugural speech before thousands on the north Capitol grounds Tuesday.

Patrick and Governor Greg Abbott laid out property tax cuts as their top priority at Tuesday Inaugural Ceremony. They were also united on the subject of school choice, saying that this will be the session in which the state joins 30 others in passing some sort of choice program. Though the legislation is still forthcoming, such measures typically allows parents to withdraw their students from public school and take the amount the state is spending to educate them to go to a private school. This plan has faced staunch opposition in the past, especially from small, rural districts who need every dollar they have. Patrick said this session, the plan will ensure these rural schools are taken care of. “The Governor and I will have a plan to protect those schools financially and to make sure those parents have choice also,” said Patrick. “We are going to pass school choice.”

Another issue both men raised in their inaugural addresses is electric grid stability. With the 2021 winter storm still fresh in the minds of lawmakers, there will likely be a bevy of bills aimed at ensuring the lights stay on in Texas no matter what. Governor Abbott praised last session’s efforts toward that goal. “Last summer we set eleven all-time power generation records and last month, we weathered brutally freezing temperatures across the state all without any disruptions,” he said, “This session we will build a grid that will power this state, not for the next four years, but for the next forty years.”

Patrick was more specific about plans for stability, saying that the state must incentivize dispatchable generation, like natural gas plants, in order to ensure there is plenty of electricity to meet the demands of one of the fastest growing states in America. “We need dispatchable energy we can count on. We will add more megawatts of thermal generation and strengthen the grid,” he said.

Many of the priorities laid out by Patrick for the session are well represented in the Senate draft budget released Wednesday afternoon. It includes \$350 million for rural law enforcement, and \$2.5 billion to create a university fund for institutions outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems. It would allocate \$4.6 billion towards state border security efforts, more money for state hospitals and mental health services, and \$228 million towards foster care reform.

Huffman, in her first session heading up the Senate Finance Committee, said in a statement accompanying the release that the budget continues the conservative and sustainable spending policies that have left Texas in such an advantageous position. She also acknowledged that there is still much that could change between today and when a final budget, passed by both chambers, is presented to the governor for his signature. “The base budget is a starting point, and I look forward to working with my colleagues to develop a conservative and sustainable budget that addresses our needs and strengthens our economy.”

Representative Slaton Files Legislation To Further Secure Texas Prisons

Representative Bryan Slaton, HD-2, filed HB 1438 to improve the safety and security of Texas Prisons by empowering the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to install and maintain cellular jamming devices in Texas prisons. The installation of these devices in Texas prisons will increase safety for corrections officers, and help facilitate the end of contraband cell phone use in criminal activities.

Representative Bryan Slaton issued the following statement: “There s no reason that Texas should not utilize this type of technology to keep our prisons secure. By allowing the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to install cell phone jamming devices in our prisons, we will be instituting common-sense safety procedures that will be a powerful tool against illegal activities such as drug trafficking, sex trafficking, escapes, and perhaps most importantly, making it much more difficult for hardened criminals to plan attacks against the men and women who work at our prisons and their families.

Rep. Slaton further added:“Federal facilities can already utilize this and other types of technology to protect federal workers, and Texans deserve the same protections. The men and women of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice work hard to keep our prisons secure every day. It is an arduous and often dangerous job. This bill will not only help them do their jobs more easily, but will keep them and their families safe as well.”
